Directions: Answer <u>all</u> of the following questions in relation to your book. Be sure to write your answers using <u>complete sentences</u> and <u>specific examples from the book</u>. Finally, be sure to <u>answer ALL parts of each question</u>.

- 1. Describe the *setting* of your novel. Where and when does the overall story take place? Is the setting extremely important to your book? Why or why not?
- 2. Give a *characterization* of your main character. Make sure to identify who your main character is, and list and explain <u>at least two traits</u> for this character. (If you have two or more main characters, you may choose any two and discuss one character trait for each.)
- 3. What are some of the main issues or problems the main character(s) faces? How does he/she/they attempt to deal with these issues? Are these personal problems, or problems the whole society shares? Explain.
- 4. Choose either a positive or negative *secondary character* is your main character's life. What is the relationship between your main character and this character? What makes them play a positive or negative role in the main character's life? Explain.
- 5. Discuss how the **major conflict** in your book is resolved. How does your main character change or grow in some way by the end of your book? Explain.
- 6. What is a possible *theme* for this novel? (*Remember, theme is the universal message of a novel). What details from the novel help to show this theme?
- 7. What is the genre of your novel? Explain why your book fits in this genre.

<u>Directions</u>: Choose any **ONE** of the following questions to answer. Remember to use complete sentences and specific examples from the book, and to answer **ALL** parts of the question.

- 8. What did you enjoy about this novel? What would you have done differently if you were the writer? Explain.
- 9. If you could have a conversation with one character from the novel who would it be? Why? What would you discuss with him or her? Explain.
- 10. What is the meaning of the title? How does the title of your book relate to the story?
